OBITUARY: Miss Alma L. Johnson, Noted Businesswoman, Dies here at Age 65. Miss Alma L. Johnson, who had retired on Feb. 1 after 31 years of service with Bridgeman Creameries of Crookston died unexpectedly Tuesday at her home in the Myrold Building in Crookston. Death was attributed to an apparent heart attach.

about her retirement which appeared in the Crookston Times on Feb. 1.

Miss Johnson had also served as state treasurer for the Minnesota Federation of Business and Professional Women's Club.

She was also a member of the American Legion Auxiliary and the Order of Eastern Star. She was in the Armed Forces in the WAAC from June 10, 1943 to Aug. 16. 1943 when she was discharged because of allergies.

Survivors include two sisters; Mrs. N. V. Torgerson of Adams and Mrs. L. E. Knutson of Seattle, Wash, and two brothers, Edwin and Wallace Johnson of Adams. The Torgersons are pres-enty vacationing in Florida and have not been able to be contacted.

She was preceded in death by her parents, three sisters and three brothers.

Funeral services will be held Friday at 2 p. m. at Trinity Lutheran Church with the Rev. Ralph Tellefsen officiating. The body may be viewed Thursday afternoon and evening at the Stenshoel Chapel and at the church Friday one hour be-fore services. The body will be taken Adams, Minn., where funeral services will be held. Burial will be in Little Cedar Cemetery at Adams in the spring.
